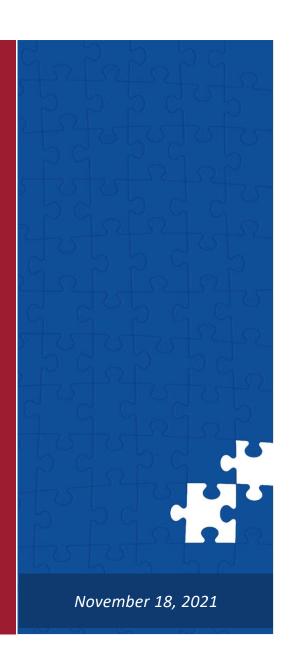

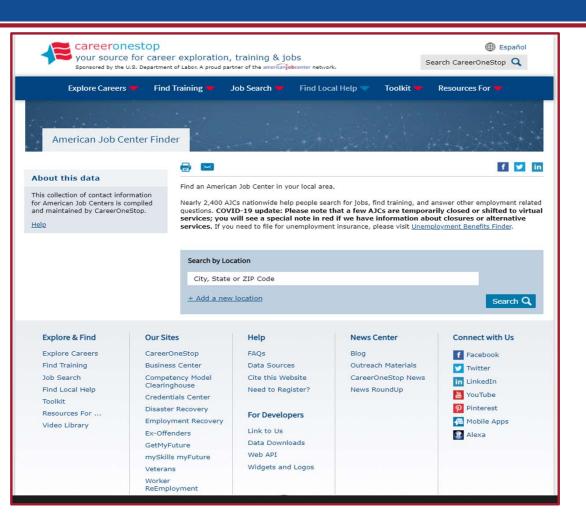


How does it work?

 Workforce programs for eligible adults and dislocated workers provide services through the American Job Center (also known as the Career One-Stop) network. The AJC network includes both required and additional partner programs delivering integrated services in a high-quality workforce development system.



Public Workforce System



AJC integrated services include:

- Career Exploration / Assessments (O*Net)
- Job Search Assistance / Workforce Preparation
- Education & Training Resources
- Local help from AJCs & other community services
- Occupational Data get wages, employment trends, skills needed, and more for any occupation
- Career Development services
- Toolkits and Resources

These services are available to workers and businesses through a network of approx. **2,400** American Job Centers (AJCs) nationwide, also known as One-Stop Career Centers.



Public Workforce System, continued

- Within ETA, the Office of Workforce Investment (OWI) provides oversight of governance and service delivery for programs authorized under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) and delivered through the One-Stop delivery system. All programs are designed to assist communities, educators, businesses, and job seekers (e.g., adults, dislocated and transitioning workers, disadvantaged youth, veterans, older workers, individuals with disabilities, migrant and seasonal farmworkers, Indians and Native Americans, and others) compete in a changing global economy. Services are designed to meet local needs and may vary from state to state.

Government Incentives, Tax Credits, and Assistance for Employers

The publicly-funded <u>workforce investment system</u> can be a valuable addition to your human resource capabilities, and an invaluable tool to transform your workforce for the 21st-century economy. The DOL programs below are available to help employers reduce costs and/or assist employers with their employee needs.

- Federal Bonding Program
- Unemployment Insurance Information
- Work Opportunity Tax Credit





Federal Bonding Program (FBP)

- Employers can receive **fidelity bonds free of charge** when hiring certain "hard to place" job applicants, including justice-involved citizens. The bonds reimburse the employer for any loss due to employee theft **(\$5,000 up to \$25,000)** and cover the first 6 months of employment at no cost to the job applicant or the employer (\$0 deductible).
- Fidelity bonds can be applied to **ANY job, ANY state, and to ANY eligible employee** (excluding a self-employed individual) who is paid wages and has Federal taxes automatically deducted. To date, FBP has issued over 50,000 bonds.

Work Opportunity Tax Credit

- The Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) is a federal tax credit available to employers who invest in American job seekers who have consistently faced barriers to employment. Employers may meet their business needs and claim a tax credit if they hire an individual who is in a WOTC targeted group, such as a Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) Referral.
- The credit available ranges from \$2,400 up to \$9,600, depending on the targeted group and qualified wages paid to the employee.
- The American Job Centers and partnering agencies and programs can help employers connect with skilled job seekers who may be in a targeted group for the WOTC. Partner agencies such as VR agencies can determine whether a job seeker may be in a WOTC targeted group, and issue Conditional Certifications, alerting prospective employers to the availability of the tax credit.
- In fiscal year 2020, SWAs issued over **1,620,000** certificates to employers; **33,470 certifications** (2%) for **VR Referrals**.

WORK OPPORTUNITY TAX CREDIT Quick Reference Guide for Employers

Did you know that in 2020, State Workforce Agencies issued 1.6 million certifications to employers seeking a Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC)?

WHAT IS WOTC?

The WOTC is a federal tax credit available to employers who invest in American job seekers who have consistently faced barriers to employment. Employers may meet their business needs and claim a tax credit if they hire an faced parriers to employment, employers may meet men ousness needs and claim a wax decar may mean individual who is in a WOTC targeted group. Employers must apply for and receive a certification verifying the new hire is a member of a targeted group before they can claim the tax credit. After the required certification is secured, taxable employers claim the WOTC as a general business credit against their income taxes, and tax-exempt employers claim the WOTC against their payroll taxes.

BENEFITS TO EMPLOYERS

The credit available ranges from \$2,400 up to \$9,600, depending on the targeted group and qualified wages paid to the new employee generally during the first year of employment. Generally, the credit is 40% of qualified first-year wages for individuals who work 400+ hours in their first year of employment.

HOW CAN EMPLOYERS FIND JOB **CANDIDATES IN WOTC TARGETED** GROUPS?

The American Job Centers and partnering agencies and programs can help employers connect with skilled job seekers who may be in a targeted group for the WOTC. American Job Centers (AJCs) can assist employers in recruiting talent, hosting job fairs. conducting skills assessment, and providing support to workers transitioning to new jobs.

Some jobseekers may also be pre-certified as in a WOTC targeted group. This pre-certification can be helpful, but is not required for hiring or claiming the tax credit, and job candidates that may be a good fit for your business and eligible for the WOTC may not have

or participating agency can determine whether a job seeker may be in a WOTC targeted group, and note this determination with a Conditional Certification, ETA Form 9062. The state agency then gives that pre certification to the job-ready applicant to use during their job search. The Conditional Certification serves ar as official record of WOTC pre-certification by:

- Alerting prospective employers to the availability
 of the tax credit if the individual is hired, and
 Providing a means for employers to request a WOTC certification for the job applicant/new hire

A "participating agency" is a federal, state, county, or local government agency or a grantee of these agencies. Examples of participating agencies may include:

- American Job Centers
- Vocational Rehabilitation agencies
- City and county social service offices
- Department of Corrections Veterans Administration and related service
- organizations

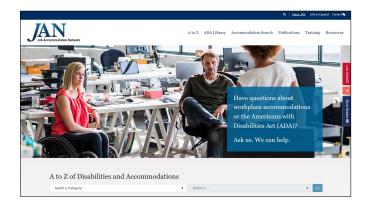

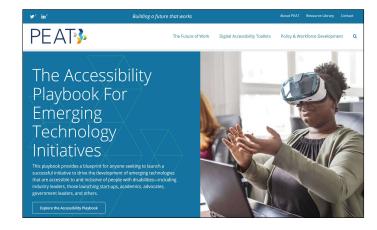

Non-Paid Work Experience Program

• The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), Non-Paid Work Experience (NPWE) program provides eligible Veterans and Service members the opportunity to obtain training and practical job experience concurrently. NPWE program may be established in federal, state, or local (e.g. city, town, school district) government agencies only. Agencies interested in setting up a NPWE to recruit Veterans and Service members can email VR&E's Employment Services Team at EmploySpec.VBACO@va.gov or by calling 202-461- 9600.
